UN's Sustainable Development Goals

Helsinki was the 1st in Europe and the 2nd city in the world to commit to the Voluntary Local Review (VLR) model created by the City of New York. So far, more than 100 cities from all over the world have joined these efforts. Helsinki is completing its third report in 2023.



Sustainable urban development is not an empty promise in Helsinki. Sustainable solutions are not only environmentally friendly and energyefficient in Helsinki, but they are also made of citizen wellbeing, equality and functional everyday life.



The 2023 report highlights five success factors:

- Sustainable development learning path integrated into early childhood education.
- Increased production of renewable energy, improved air quality.
- Promotion of cultural equality an important priority throughout the cultural sector.
- Improved attractiveness of residential areas and high-quality complementary construction enabled via **suburban regeneration model**.
- Development of mental health service chains, and investments to support physical activity and hobbies.

Official partner of Helsinki Pride

City of Helsinki promotes equality and non-discrimination widely in its services and personnel. The City has been the official partner of Helsinki Pride for several years. <u>Human Rights Helsinki</u>

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Social responsibility in procurement

City of Helsinki promotes social responsibility also through procurements. The goal is to prevent work-related exploitation and to take human rights widely into account. Preventing segregation of residential areas


The purpose of the suburban regeneration is to improve the comfort and appeal of residential areas comprehensively and facilitate high-quality infill construction. Suburban regeneration is a tool, which Helsinki uses to achieve the strategic goal of being a city with equally safe and appealing neighborhoods, thus facilitating the equality and well-being of different city districts.



Preventing segregation of residential areas

Suburban regeneration refers to the comprehensive development of the impacted areas. The objectives of suburban regeneration are divided into four different focal areas:

- vitality
- urban environment
- services,
- participation.



Preventing segregation of residential areas

The pilot areas in this cross-administrative model are the districts of Malminkartano-Kannelmäki, Malmi and Mellunkylä. Each area is also part of the Helsinki Innovation Districts bringing innovation activities and smart urban development to the districts. For residents, the project is particularly visible in the form of experiments in street space and city blocks.


Helsinki Welfare Plan 2022–2025

The City of Helsinki Welfare Plan 2022– 2025 is one way to reduce inequalities in welfare and health of Helsinki residents, to contribute improving the quality of life of the city's residents and to implement the "A Place of Growth" city strategy of the City Council.

Helsinki Welfare Plan 2022–2025

The welfare plan plays an important role in promoting the objectives of social sustainability, in particular health and welfare, reducing inequalities, sustainable cities and communities, and eradicating poverty. More indirectly, the plan supports many other UN goals.





Helsinki Welfare Plan 2022–2025

The welfare plan is being **implemented by all City of Helsinki divisions** and the City Executive Office in cooperation with partners, such as organisations and educational institutions. The plan has **six priorities** for promoting welfare and health: mental wellbeing, leisure and recreation, physical activity, healthy lifestyles, good community relations and a safe and beautiful city.

Physical Activity promotion

Helsinki has launched a Physical Activity Programme, with the aim of encouraging its residents to move more and sit less. Helsinki wants to make physical activity an easy and attractive choice in people's everyday lives. Every step helps! Helsinkiliikkuu.fi/en

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Stadin Safka food aid

Stadin safka is a service provided by the City of Helsinki that develops the food aid process together with other food aid actors and utilises surplus food to benefit people. One of the goals is to develop food aid to support people's inclusion and help build community. Stadin safka



Participatory budget 'OmaStadi'

In OmaStadi residents are given the opportunity to participate in the decisionmaking process. The City allocates 8.8 million euros to realising residents' wishes. The ideas are developed together into proposals that anybody could vote on. The proposals with the most votes are realised by the City. OmaStadi

Launched in 2020 the talent attraction concept Helsinki Freedom consists of various themes around social sustainability. Building on the ten Helsinki Freedoms, that constitute the corner stones for good life, it is a rewardwinning example of value-based marketing that is bold and diverse.





Helsinki Freedom

In Helsinki, freedom means creating a life that looks like you without compromising.

- 1. Freedom to find balance
- 2. Freedom to feel safe
- 3. Freedom to love
- 4. Freedom to breathe
- 5. Freedom to learn and grow
- 6. Freedom to be equal
- 7. Freedom to be fragile
- 8. Freedom to speak from the heart
- 9. Freedom to take action
- 10. Freedom for trial and error.



Helsinki Freedom

The concept consisted of 5 minidocumentaries, 30 My Freedom stories, home delivered activation and looking for freedom guerilla campaign. Active collaboration between the different local stakeholders, City of Helsinki, companies and universities among others, was one of the key factors of success.

Launched in 2019, Think Sustainably helps visitors and locals to choose more sustainably by combining sustainable services, experiences, and transportation in Helsinki into one easy-to-use digital service on MyHelsinki.fi.

The base of the service is on sustainability criteria that have been tailor-made for Helsinki*, highlighting ecological and social sustainability as well as different dimensions of environmental responsibility.


The service is accessible to all local service providers and fits different types and sizes of organisations: Restaurants, cafés and bars, Shops, Attractions, Accommodation, Events and Venues.

Not a new official sustainability label or certificate, and therefore the fulfillment of the criteria is not evaluated by a third party. Instead, it is based on trust and transparency.



Think Sustainably: examples on social sustainability criteria

- Staff members can spend a certain amount of their working time volunteering.
- The operator actively and prominently promotes equality and nondiscrimination. In addition, both customers and staff have clear guidelines for reporting and addressing inappropriate behaviour.
- Some of the proceeds are donated to **charitable activities or charities**. For example, the operator has been granted the Finnish Social Enterprise Mark.
- The location is **fully accessible**. Information about accessibility of the premises is clearly available.
- The attraction also allows free admission of certain times.
- The operator **employes** people who may otherwise be difficult to plane in the work environment.



In a nutshell: Sustainable Travel Finland

- The <u>Sustainable Travel Finland</u> (STF) programme provides companies and destinations a 7-step sustainable tourism development path that makes it easier to adopt sustainable practices in everyday business. Companies and destinations that undergo the entire programme are recognised with the STF label.
- The programme is accessible to all Finnish tourism companies and destinations who wish to develop their operations towards a more sustainable direction, including restaurants, accommodation, travel agencies, activity providers, attractions, transportation companies, events and resorts.
- Operators commit to regularly renewing Sustainable Travel Finland label, including a valid audited certificate/updated frontrunner company documentation, and updated self-assessment, development plan and sustainable tourism indicators.

In a nutshell: Sustainable Meeting Model

- A toolbox that helps event organisers make more sustainable choices when organising conferences and meetings as well as to set clear objectives for the event right from the outset.
- Comprises of a sustainability criteria that includes i.a. material use, waste management, diversity and inclusion, good governance and communication. Aligned with SDGs, supports the city's carbon-neutrality goals.
- The model provides a comprehensive and easy-to-follow check list for:
 - Travel & transportation
 - Accommodation & venues
 - Food & beverages
 - AV & material production
 - Experience design & communication
 - Performance documentation.
